Back 2 School, Vaccines Rule: August is National Immunization Awareness Month



Vaccines keep your child healthy and safe during the school year. Many schools do not let a child attend school without getting vaccinated first. A vaccine can be given at your child's yearly checkup. It is important to talk to your doctor about your child's allergies before getting a shot.¹

How Vaccines Work

16 diseases can be prevented with vaccines.² Vaccines help your body become immune to a disease. The diseases a vaccine prevents are harmful, and could lead to death. Many diseases that your child receives a vaccine for are not common. This is because the use of vaccines has prevented it from being passed on.

Preteen/ Teen Immunization Week (August 21-27)

Vaccines are important to get at every age. August 21-27 is National Preteen/ Teen Immunization Week. Talk to your doctor about making your preteen/ teen a yearly checkup. This will make sure they are safe and ready to go back to school.

The four shots all preteen/ teens need¹:

- ♥ **Tdap:** protects against heart and lung diseases (Age 11-12)
- ♥ **Meningococcal:** protects against brain, spine, and blood infection (Age 11-12 and Age 16)
- ♥ **HPV:** protects against HPV infection and cancer. (Age 11-12, 2 shots)
- ♥ **Flu:** protects against the flu and spreading it to other people (All ages)

Why Vaccinate at Age 11-12?

HPV vaccine is best given when your child is between the ages of 11-12. The vaccine works better before they are sexually active. The body's immune response is greater in the pre-teen years. The vaccine is more protective for your child³.

HPV Facts³:

- ♥ Every year in the United States **17,500** women and **9,300** men have HPV- related cancers
- ♥ HPV can cause: anal, mouth, throat, cervix, vulva, vagina, and penis cancer
- ♥ The HPV vaccine can prevent these types of cancers

Pregnancy Corner

OB:

An Obstetrician (OB) is the doctor that helps you before, throughout, and after your pregnancy.

They make sure you and your baby are healthy.



The 5 W's of a Postpartum Visit

WHO: A woman after she gives birth

WHAT: A visit with your OB to make sure you are ok after giving birth

WHERE: At your OB's Office

WHEN: 21- 56 Days after giving birth

WHY: A Postpartum visit important because you can⁴:

- ♥ **Talk** to your doctor about birth control including long acting reversible contraception (LARC)
- ♥ **Ask** about any problems you had throughout pregnancy
- ♥ **Share** feelings or concerns about being a new mom
- ♥ **Get** a physical exam and a pelvic exam

Cesarean (C-Section) Checkup

A woman who had a C-section birth should make an appointment for a C-section Checkup. At this visit with your OB, they will make sure the incision cut is healing. The visit should be 2 weeks after birth. After this visit, you should make an appointment to go back for your postpartum visit.
